



Gosberton Academy – Sports Premium Statement

Review of 2021-22 and Planned expenditure of 2022-23

Written July 2022.

What is the Sports Premium?

Since March 2013 the Government have provided additional funding to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools in England – The Primary PE & Sport Premium. This funding – provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport – is allocated to primary school head teachers and is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

Purpose of funding:

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Vision:

All pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Objective:

To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. We would expect indicators of such improvement to include:

- The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
- The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
- Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport

- Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- Increased participation in competitive sport

Project	Outcomes
Members of the Boston School Sport Partnership	The Sports Partnership has given the school the opportunity to take part in a large number of different sporting activities this year. These have given both Key Stages the opportunity to be involved in activities, development days and competitions both on and off site. The way the competition structure has been set, has given pupils across Key Stage 2 a large access to competitive sport, which has also seen large numbers being involved. *See calendar below
Members of Elite Sports Academy competitions	Elite Sports Academy organise competitive sporting competitions to allow learners the opportunity to develop their understanding of a range of competitive sports.
Elite Sports Academy inter-school competitions	Due to Covid-19, Elite Sports Academy created another way of ensuring learners had the opportunity to compete against other schools. This continued into the 2021-22 academic year, and Gosberton Academy learners have been able to compete in: Tri-Golf, Archery and New-Age Kurling competitions
After school sports coaching and clubs (free of charge)	Every week during the academic year, all learners have the opportunity to attend a free after-school sports club. This is run by Elite Sports Academy and the focus for the clubs change throughout the academic year. These have been well-attended and learners have been able to experience new sports, learn new skills and become more confident during these activities.

Invest in new playtime equipment to encourage active playtimes	All learners in KS1 and KS2 have access to the new play equipment. The equipment is used at break and lunchtime.
Swimming	Due to many of our learners being able to swim 25metres as they come towards the end of Key Stage 2, we have been able to enhance our learners water activities by adding further activities to some groups during the academic year.
Sports Development Week	All learners were able to experience a sports week with Elite Sports Academy. This week was used to experience a range of different sports, looking at building on their PE learning over the past couple of years to incorporate those into new activities.
Playground Leader Training	10 Year 4 learners were trained to ensure that they were able to engage learners with a variety of games during breaks and lunch times. The Year 4 learners worked on a rota and engaged all ages of learners with fun, active sessions and games.
Athletics Competition – Local Feeder Secondary Schools	Year 4, 5 and 6 learners were able to attend an athletics competition at the local secondary school and compete against other local schools.
Lunchtime Clubs	Staff have led lunchtime clubs to further develop sporting skills and understanding as well as increase physical activity. These have been sport-specific clubs looking at developing skills.
PGL Trip – Year 5 and 6 learners	Year 5 and 6 learners had the opportunity to experience a range of outdoor and adventurous activities over a three day residential. This allowed them the opportunities to challenge themselves, learn new skills and work together to achieve their targets.

The above information is recorded from school swimming lessons that take place each week.

During the academic year, each child would attend weekly swimming sessions for one full term, either Autumn, Spring or Summer.

Impact

Our staff and learners are benefitting greatly from the Sports Premium funding, which is having a positive impact on our pupils' physical wellbeing, as well as broadening all of our horizons with regard to sporting experiences. Below is an outline of the impact that the Sport Premium Funding has had on our school and pupils;

- We have been able to offer a wider variety of sports clubs, including those run by specialist sports coaches. These have included opportunities for sports which may not have been experienced by learners previously such as archery, new-age kurling, capture the flag and many more. The clubs have continued to further promote and develop a range of sporting skills which can be applied across a variety of sports. Through the range of physical activities, learners have been able to recognise that although sport can be competitive, it can be useful in a variety of other ways – creating and forming relationships, mental health and wellbeing, developing resilience, promoting challenge and developing collaborative skills
- After-school clubs have continued to be well attended and 72% of the learners at Gosberton Academy have attended at least one club. This is similar to 2020-21 (70%).
- The increased attendance at sports clubs has also had a significant impact on the learners' abilities and confidence. The Headteacher teaches all of the PE at Gosberton Academy and this has allowed a clear progression throughout the school for developmental skills needed in a range of sporting activities. The introduction of the same teaching assistant in all PE lessons has developed her subject knowledge and allowed her the opportunity to work on her PE delivery and support. She is now confident with PE delivery and able to lead groups/classes at points throughout the academic year.
- 100% of learners have experienced some further sporting development sessions from external companies and sports clubs.
- 76% of learners in Y6 were able to swim 25 metres by the end of Y6.
- As a result of the learners' range of experiences, more learners have started to take part in physical activity outside of school. 60% of Key Stage 2 learners take part in sport outside of school. Some of the activities include: football, cricket, rugby, gymnastics, tennis, dance, horse riding, swimming and hockey.
- 100% of learners were engaged by a professional football freestyler – the engagement day ensured all learners understood that sport and being physically active is not all about competitive sport. This event was hugely popular and was talked about by learners well after the event.
- Competitive sport returned as a result of us coming out of the Covid-19 pandemic and many learners have had the opportunity to compete against other schools. In 2021-22, there was a mix of face-to-face competitive sports and 'virtual' competitions where schools competed in their own school.

How will we be spending our Sports Funding 2022/2023?

At Gosberton Academy we understand the importance of physical activity and sport. We believe that being active, working as a team and trying new sports is vital to the overall

wellbeing of our pupils. With this in mind we propose to spend this additional Sports Premium funding in the following ways:

- Membership to the Boston Sports Partnership
- Transport to sports events
- Employ specialist sports coaches to lead after-school activities for all learners.
- Enter competitive events run by Elite Sports Academy
- Offer after school and lunchtime sports coaching and clubs
- Subsidise the Y6 PGL Residential. Money to contribute to the cost of the residential to allow more learners to attend and experience outdoor and adventurous learning.
- Purchase new sports and playground equipment
- Invest in training sports leaders to lead activities

- Work with local sports clubs to raise learners’ sporting involvement outside of school. Promote sporting opportunities outside of school and continue to point learners in the right direction of different clubs across a wide range of sports.
- Bikeability – To provide bikeability for year 5 and 6 pupils to promote road safety and engage in physical activity.
- Enter school leagues to build on skills being taught in their clubs and to ensure opportunities for competitive sport are available for a wide range of learners.
- Balanceability training. Primary Cycling for EYFS learners
- Purchase pedometers, or an equivalent, for all learners to raise awareness and create challenge about being physically active.
